


Final Sketches




These sketches were the ones I based my final design on. After working with my prototype, I realized I drew some of the panels in the wrong spot and adjusted it accordingly.

First Prototype




My first prototype solely focused on how the panels were going to fold and which panels would be visible in relation to another. This prototype gives two different options to flip through, both depending on an accordion type fold.




First option when flipping through started on the cover/1st page....




...when folded open, it would reveal panel 2 and 3 as a spread.



Flipping to the next page would land the user on the back page.





From there, the user could flip through the other four pages at the back. 5 and 6 would make a spread, and 7 and 8 would make a spread. But unfolding it out more, it was possible to have 5, 6, 7, 8 as one large spread.





I had two forms of content - one that talks about the violence and direct consequences of domestic violence, the other more of the aftermath. The former would require more panels and in the narrative I was creating, would be better to have happen first. So I did not go with this option.












The resources would be provided on the back panel/cover as it would be a convenient spot to flip to as you just have to flip the pamphlet on its back to access. I ended up going with this option.







Women staying at shelters, by type and whether for reasons of abuse, Canada, April 16, 2014





I changed the bar graph to a stacked bar graph as it would emphasize that it was information out of a whole, and it was still easy to compare the values via height (bottom to top for red, top to bottom for black).






This infographic was based off the above original because of the important information it contained. The information was suited to be shown in a line graph as it was showing change over time. However I made a few changes to the style of the graph to improve the readability and understanding of the information it held.



I used a lighter colour for the numbers and guides so it would not be so distracting, but then added more guides to make it easier to locate the associated number of shelters to each year. I drew the lines directly from each year as supposed to a range around it to help make this process easier.





Afterwards I added in the Canadian Women's Foundation as the advocate for the issue. I grayscaled their original logo so it matched my colour palette better (as opposed to their original rather vibrant colour palette). I also vectored their logo in illustrator to get a higher quality image.











Half-Sized Flat Pamphlet



Created a mini, half-sized, black and white mock-up and flat versions of the pamphlet and poster. This time I doubled sided on the black and white printer as opposed to printing two separate sheets. Unfortunately, no matter how you set up your file, the printer does not double side perfectly and thus both sides did not quite line up. For the mock-up, I cut it so the pamphlet side was properly cut, while the poster had some white edging because of the incorrect double sided printing. I decided for the folded mock-up it was more important to get the pamphlet accurate than the poster. I applied final changes to my poster based on these notes.


